The Tuskegee Airmen were notorious in their role of protecting bombers during World War II and as an Air Force Global Strike Command Airman, cadets can continue that legacy. Platforms include the B-52 Stratofortress, the B-2 Spirit, the B-1 Lancer, and Coming soon the B-21 Raider.

The 21st Century Striker honors the Tuskegee Airmen legacy by providing indefinite strategic deterrence anytime, anywhere.

Upon graduation, Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets will have the opportunity to train and compete to fly bomber aircraft during Undergraduate Pilot Training. Project Tuskegee's mission is not only to provide opportunities to cadets in Air Force Global Strike Command mission early, but to connect them with personnel and resources that will assist them in joining the Mighty Eighth Air Force after graduation.



Following its activation on 4 April 1944, Twentieth Air Force led the strategic air offensive against Japan. This culminated in the atomic bombing of Hiroshima

and Nagasaki which led to the end of WWII. Following service in the Korean War, 20 AF was inactivated on 1 Mar. 1955. Activated once more on 1 Sep. 1991, 20 AF gained responsibility for operating, maintaining, securing, and supporting the United States of America's Intercontinental Ballistic Missile force. Today the Airmen of Air Force Global Strike Command continue to provide 24/7, 365 day a year, alert and combat ready ICBMs to the President.

Operating the Minuteman III ICBM weapon system, soon to be replaced by LGM-35A Sentinel, Strikers of 20 AF provide an integral strategic deterrence mission set that protects the United States, as well as our allies and partners around the globe. Project Tuskegee's mission is not only to promote opportunities to cadets in Air Force Global Strike Command mission early in their AFROTC careers, but to connect them with the personnel and resources that will assist them in becoming Missileers after graduation.

The U.S. War Department established the 99th Pursuit Squadron, among others, one of which became known as the Tuskegee Airmen.



Air Force Global Strike Command was activated in 2009 and is responsible for the operation, maintenance, and security of two legs of the nuclear triad.

While escorting B-17 bombers on a mission to Berlin, Germany, the 332nd Fighter Group took part in the longest raid of Fifteenth Air Force, the parent unit of the 2nd Bombardment Group, now AFGSC's 2nd Bomb Wing.
